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# TOWN CENTER MASTER PLAN PROJECT UPDATE

The Town Center Master Plan work, a grant from the Oregon Department of Transportation through the Transportation Growth Management Grant Program, is moving forward. In the last several weeks, we have engaged diverse communities with focus groups hosted by interpreters and leaders in the Hispanic, Russian, Ukrainian, Vietnamese and Laotian communities. Over 100 individuals attended one of the focus groups and helped provide their unique perspective to the potential development of the Town Center.



Several common themes appeared in the focus groups, including:

- The master plan needs to support family needs and safety
- Current Town Center area needs improvements for lighting and landscaping
- Family gathering places, safe walking and biking and safe streets are essential
- Home ownership housing options were preferred, while support is present for a variety of other more dense housing options if open space and public gathering areas are included
- Family Fun Center or similar recreational opportunities would be welcome, along with a variety of specialty retail and restaurant uses identified
- Whatever we do, the work should have a vision to set the standard for the Wood Village community for the future

The first of two community wide meetings was conducted on February 16. The meeting attracted attendance of over seventy (70) residents who combined to provide their input to a range of potential plans for the area. As the plans and all of the input provided is sorted by the consulting group working with the City, we will provide feedback on potential options in the months ahead.


Work on the Town Center planning efforts will be continuing through November of 2016, with a final plan scheduled for adoption during the winter.

# HALSEY ST. SEWER LINE: PROJECT UPDATE



The Halsey St. Sanitary Sewer Capacity Upgrade project is underway, the new pipe has been laid out in the City Hall gravel parking lot, the pulling chain has been delivered and the pits for both launching and receiving the new pipe have been dug. Driving along Halsey St. between City Hall and Wood Village Blvd. it's obvious that the work is progressing.

The pictures illustrate how this process will be done: a machine on the end of a couple of hundred feet of 2" very heavy chain jerks the steel cone-shaped end attached to the pipe through the existing concrete pipe "bursting" it and increasing the size from the existing 8" to the new 12" size. This process greatly diminishes the amount of actual digging involved and utilizes the existing pipe alignment, following it from manhole to manhole.



The third picture is of the trench and the excavation necessary to launch the new pipe from the manhole at the bottom of the picture in the direction of the large excavator. The expectation is that only eight of these pits will need to be dug. Not only does this reduce the amount of excavation, but it also reduces the cost of replacement gravel and asphalt surfacing.

Even with some permitting delays the project is still on schedule, and from the timeline provided by the contractor, should be completed by the middle of April.

This project is to accommodate the expected growth of the Town Center and future plans for residential and commercial development. The high priority project comes as No. 1 from the City's 2015 Waste Water Master Plan's list of capital improvement projects which details the need for this increased capacity.

# CITY COUNCIL RETREAT

The Wood Village City Council and Staff conducted a day long special workshop, called a retreat, in January of this year. The meeting was facilitated by Sam Imperati, Associate with ICMRESOLUTIONS, Inc. The City Council reviewed detailed evaluations of the financial projection for the City finances for the next five years, the potential terms to include in offering materials for the sale of the City Hall properties, potential investments in the branding and image for Wood Village, and the history and future for the Wood Village Urban renewal District.

The City Council annual meeting is to provide focus to the vision, mission, and goals for Wood Village, and the discussions lead to the creation of an Annual Performance Plan (APP), essentially the blueprint for investments in time and budget for the year ahead to lead to achieving the Goals of the community.

The Mission Statement for Wood Village is:

A unique, small city with exemplary public services, fiscal responsibility, and progressive leadership providing a safe, livable community while promoting business vitality and growth.

Our goals are:

- GOAL 1:** A safe, clean, livable community with a sense of pride, quality housing, and strong identity.
- GOAL 2:** Excellent police, fire and building services.
- GOAL 3:** High Quality, cost-effective public utilities, parks and events.
- GOAL 4:** Long-term financial stability, economic vitality and growth.
- GOAL 5:** A work environment that develops and encourages employees and rewards their creativity and innovation.
- GOAL 6:** Effective local, state and regional partnerships.
- GOAL 7:** Environmental Responsibility.



Wood Village is in excellent financial condition, and with the guidance of the City Council, has made all the adjustments needed to successfully emerge from the recession with financial reserves intact and with a sustainable financial future for the next several years. While statewide difficulties with how the revenue system in Oregon functions will constrain annual revenue increases to a level that is generally below the increases in cost to provide services, the City has been able to respond to these challenges in the past five years, and patterns indicate we will again be positioned to sustain service levels to our residents throughout the projection period. The City Council is beginning to discuss investing in projects that they believe might substantially change the appearance and quality of life in Wood Village in the years ahead.

SALE**

The annual events in Wood Village are a key part of what makes the town special. From the Easter Egg hunt to the Nite Out and Clean Up day, Wood Village has a series of great events for our residents. The year ahead will include the addition of a City Wide Garage Sale, an opportunity to have all our residents and businesses participate in an event to invite the region to our town. We will also be working on a fall event dealing with pumpkin carving to celebrate the Halloween holiday.


The City Council will be reviewing a potential plan for the year ahead over the next several months, and will be providing the direction for City wide activities in 2016-17. This promises to be a great year, with Arata Road, the Town Center development, potential sale and development of City Hall properties, and new economic development partners joining our City. We will be reporting back when the City Council adopts the plan for next year.

## TREEHILL PRESSURE ZONE EXCHANGE

Treehill and Cottonwood residents met with City staff January 25<sup>th</sup> to discuss the two potential projects the City is considering to improve the water pressure available to the two condominium associations and to change the current meter arrangement from 30 existing meters to a single master meter, reducing the cost to the City and bringing the association in line with other privately owned water systems.

In the past, Treehill and Cottonwood residents have been concerned with the lack of water pressure; specifically those residents in townhomes living at or near the crest of Treehill Dr. The reasons for this are

fairly easy to explain. Currently the condominium complexes are located at the high point of what the City calls the lower water system. That is, water provided to these residents and others in the Lower Village are served by wells nearby. The pumps necessary to retrieve the water from the wells then has to force the water (water pressure) to not only the Lower Village but the high points of the Lower Village – Treehill and Cottonwood. Because some of these residents are at the high point, the pressure is lower and, at times, inadequate for dishwasher, washing machines and showers.



In order to provide higher water pressure to the complexes then, a series of valves and waterlines must be installed that will allow that water from the upper pressure zone to provide water to Treehill and Cottonwood. The City has contracted with an engineering consulting firm who has come up with some alternatives and cost estimates, and we have tentatively chosen one we

believe is the most cost effective means of providing increased pressure. The estimate for construction is between \$125,000 and \$135,000.

The second project, changing out 30 water meters for one master meter, would involve simply adding a large 6” meter and backflow to the existing waterline prior to it entering into the complex property. The City has offered to make this transition free of charge to the residents though they then would be responsible for billing each unit for its water use. The City would allow the complexes to keep and maintain the existing individual meters for those billing purposes.

The two homeowners associations are currently discussing amongst themselves what course of action is most beneficial to them based on the pros and cons of the project.

### NEW ENGINEERING TECHNICIAN

# IT'S BUDGET TIME & WE WANT TO HEAR FROM YOU!

Oregon state law requires local governments to prepare a balanced budget for each fiscal year (July 1 through June 30). It's a big job involving employees, City Council members and citizens. The process has begun for the upcoming budget for this July 1. Here are the steps to complete this major process:

## Employees:

- \$ Review previous year actual revenues and expenses, and adjust for inflation & changing needs
- \$ Work with Council and citizen input to develop a list of projects to be accomplished during the upcoming year
- \$ Income must equal expenses, and there's always more "wants" than money will allow, so items are cut until the budget is balanced

## Budget Committee:

- \$ The budget, as prepared by the staff, is presented by the City Manager to the public via meetings with the Budget Committee. The Committee is comprised of the five City Councilors and five Citizen Members. *There is a vacancy open on the Budget Committee – will YOU please step forward and volunteer a few hours of your time?*
- \$ The Budget Committee discusses the budget and how it interfaces with City goals.
- \$ Recommendations for adjustment with a majority vote will adjust the budget.
- \$ **All budget meetings are open to the public: April 21<sup>st</sup> at 5:30 pm; May 24<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 pm; June 14<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 pm.**
- \$ Additional meeting times will be posted on the City's website: [www.ci.wood-village.or.us](http://www.ci.wood-village.or.us) or you can call City Hall at 503-667-6211 Mon-Fri 8:00 am to 4:30 pm for further information.

## City Council:

- \$ The budget, as approved by a majority vote of the Budget Committee, is then presented to the City Council at the May 24<sup>th</sup> Council meeting.
- \$ Changes with a majority vote can adjust the budget further if Council desires.
- \$ Council adopts the budget and levies the city tax rate, always 3.1262 per thousand of assessed value
- \$ Once adopted, the budget is a legal document for the City to follow and cannot be altered without City Council majority approval.

## THE GRAFFITI FREE ZONE

So far the City has been relatively graffiti free in 2016. There have been some problem areas, and we are working to get those cleaned up. As we enter into the spring season, we want to remind you that the City stocks free graffiti removal kits, and has an online graffiti removal



resource center. You can also report graffiti and other nuisances online as well. We encourage you to remove and report graffiti quickly. The best prevention tool is the quick removal of graffiti. The longer graffiti stays, the harder it is to remove, and the more likely it will attract additional vandalism. Let's keep up the good work, and be a graffiti free City!

# WATER SYSTEM FLUSHING

Wood Village's Public Works crew will begin flushing the water system throughout the City **DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH.**

## When will flushing be done in my neighborhood?

A flushing schedule will be posted at City Hall and on the City website at [www.ci.wood-village.or.us](http://www.ci.wood-village.or.us). Public Works staff will also place a barricade with an attached notice at the entrance of your street in advance to let you know that flushing will be taking place in your neighborhood. Flushing will normally occur between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. and your water service should not be interrupted.

## What is fire hydrant flushing?

The goal of this program is to ensure water quality is maintained at its optimal level and to properly maintain the City's water distribution lines. Flushing is a process by which water is moved through a water pipe at a high velocity so that a scouring action is created. Water then is discharged through a fire hydrant. The Public Works crew will be using a "NEW" unidirectional flushing program. Unidirectional flushing consists of



closing specific water system valves to create one way flow and then opening fire hydrants in a consecutive manner. This increases the speed of the water flow in the pipes. These high velocities remove even the most stubborn deposits. The minerals removed from this process are harmless and require no special treatment.

## Why are we flushing?

Slow movements of water through water mains during the winter months allow mineral deposits to build-up and accumulate over time. This build-up can restrict water flow in the pipes and also contributes to discolored water problems. Periodic flushing of pipes helps maintain our City's infrastructure, assures consistent high water quality and keeps hydrants operational in case of a fire emergency.

## Is flushing a waste of water?

No! The amount and cost of water used in flushing is a small price to pay compared to the benefits of assuring the quality of your water and maintaining our infrastructure.

## If you are experiencing discolored water...

If discolored water occurs, it is not a health hazard. However, during the flushing procedures, iron (red water) and manganese (black water) may become stirred-up within the water main, which can create staining on porcelain and laundry. Avoid washing laundry until your water is clear. Also small solid particles of mineral matter may be caught in faucet strainers restricting flow. Simply remove the strainer and clean out the mineral matter.

If the water appears discolored it is recommended that you run your cold water faucet for a few minutes to allow new water to work its way into your pipes. If the water is still unclear repeat the process. In some cases it may take a few hours for the water to clear. If you are experiencing any problems with your water quality or pressure after a flushing event please contact the Wood Village Public Works Department at 503-667-6211.



**238<sup>TH</sup> DR. ISLAND RENOVATION PROJECT**

The City has contracted with a local landscape design and maintenance company, Valley West, to begin work on redesigning the islands on 238<sup>th</sup> with plantings that will better withstand the harsh and exposed environment experienced in that location and also employing some design elements that speak to the Northwest and Mt. Hood/Timberline Lodge aesthetic. A preliminary design has been completed and the Parks and Recreation Board met February 17<sup>th</sup> to review the plans; offer suggestions and opinions, and approve the plan presented by Valley West staff.

Because these islands are frequently the introduction of our city to visitors, we desired to have architectural and textural features that would be remembered after leaving town. Granite rock facing similar to other Cascadian structures in the Columbia Gorge will be added to the raised entry sign location and annual, seasonal plantings will add much needed color and texture to the 238<sup>th</sup> corridor. All the trees will remain and continue to grow and add their beauty to the city landscape.



With the Commission's approval, permitting with Multnomah County will begin along with a critical traffic control plan necessary for the safety of the workers. Work is anticipated to begin by the end of March with completion in April.

- Paper ONLY shredding (limit two grocery bags per household)



- Fluorescent tubes and bulbs / boxes available at City Hall
- Cell phones

## Items NOT collected at this event

- Batteries
- Small plastics (lids, caps)
- Televisions
- Hazardous waste (paint, aerosol cans, gas cans, needles)

## PARK & INTERCEPTOR TRAIL PROJECTS

The City currently has two trail projects being worked on concurrently. The trail extending from the boardwalk south to the overlook at the southern boundary of the Donald L. Robertson Park, and a second trail beginning at City Hall to the eastern terminus of Fairview's Bridge St. along the sanitary sewer interceptor alignment.

The DLR Park trail has been previously designed and has been funded through a Metro's Nature in Neighborhoods grant and a Local Government Grant Program through Oregon State Parks and Recreation

Trails grant. The City will be advertising for landscape construction companies in the next couple of weeks to get firm cost estimates, approval of Wood Village City Council and to begin construction as soon as possible.



The second trail was conceived as a connection for pedestrians and bicycles between Fairview and Wood Village. The City's main sanitary sewer line extends from City Hall to Bridge St. and has an easement attached to it. The City's goal is to construct a trail/access road over that easement to provide and promote active transportation as well as an access for maintenance vehicles.

This project has already gotten a good start with survey being done in order to facilitate design, but the City has also been invited by Metro to submit a final grant application for additional funding for the project. We should get news of the grant in the next month or so.

## ARATA ROAD RECONSTRUCTION

The surveyors are setting flags along Arata Road, and construction work will be beginning in earnest this summer. Riad Alharithi, Rodway Engineering Services Manager with the Transportation Division of Multnomah County indicated he "expects to start construction in July, and finish major work by November with minor work to be finished in winter and spring of 2017".

The general construction template will provide a total roadway surface of 23 feet in width, a five foot wide sidewalk to the north, and a ten foot



wide combined bicycle and pedestrian area on the south side of the roadway including a storm drainage treatment area. Because of constraints in the project right of way area and other requirements, these widths may vary a little along the length of Arata from 238<sup>th</sup> to 223<sup>rd</sup>.



When the construction work on the roadway is complete, the Wood Village Urban Renewal Agency has indicated an interest in improving the remaining portions of the right of way, making sure decorative lights, banners and flower baskets adorn the roadway and working with the adjacent property owners to provide fencing.

As proposed, the Urban Renewal Agency may be providing all costs to place a simulated rock fence along the portions of the right of way where six foot fencing is permitted, and a shorter wrought iron fencing where height limits restrict the fence height to three feet. The two fencing types being considered are pictured here as general representations of the fencing that would be bid for construction along the right of way.

While much work remains to be done and the Agency has not yet established all the guidelines for the fencing proposal, we can look to Arata Road to become a very different looking part of Wood Village, with safe pedestrian and bicycle facilities and a significantly rejuvenated appearance.

# PublicAlerts



## REGISTER NOW!

The joint Portland and Multnomah County PublicAlerts system is able to send landline phone, mobile phone, text/SMS, and email alerts to addresses within Multnomah County. Public safety responders use the system to notify residents and businesses affected during an emergency. Alerts suggest urgent safety actions, such as staying inside or evacuating. PublicAlerts is preprogrammed with landline phone numbers from phone company records. To receive messages by email, text, mobile phone, or Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP), residents must register their contact information at [www.PublicAlerts.org](http://www.PublicAlerts.org).

PublicAlerts also allows residents of Portland and Multnomah County to sign up for the Additional Needs Registry (ANR) and indicate whether they may need specific disability-related assistance following a major disaster or when interacting with public safety responders. This section of PublicAlerts is voluntary and should never be considered as the only action necessary to prepare for disasters or other emergencies, nor does it ensure a prompt and thorough response if disaster strikes.

PublicAlerts is only one of the tools used by public safety responders to alert the public and is not activated in all situations. Emergency information may also be provided through broadcast and print media, social media, the PublicAlerts.org website, the Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) system, the Emergency Alert System (EAS) on TV and radio, or other means.



### WHY SIGN UP FOR PUBLIC ALERTS?

PublicAlerts is a nimble, powerful communication system connecting residents to urgent safety information. Through a combination of phone, email, and text messages, the system can reach any number of residents in any situation where fast, effective communication is essential to safety. Most landline phone users with published numbers are already included in the system. However, to receive alerts on your mobile phone or at an email address you must register through the PublicAlerts website.

### WHAT TYPES OF EMERGENCY ALERTS CAN I EXPECT TO RECEIVE?

The telephone number(s) and email addresses you register will receive notification only when their associated addresses are impacted by an emergency and public safety responders warn the public to take an urgent safety action (such as staying inside or evacuating). Here are some examples of emergencies that may trigger the use of the PublicAlerts system:
